14:00-14:20 Drive from hotel to The Royal Palace

14:30-15:30 Royal compound visit



The Royal Palace was built between 1924 and 1929 with the private funds of His Majesty King Alexander I (the grandfather of HRH Crown Prince Alexander). The palace is made of white stone in the Serbian-Byzantine style. Attached to The Royal Palace there is a Royal Chapel dedicated to Saint Apostle Andrew The First-Called, the Patron Saint of The Royal Family. The Royal Palace was the home of King Alexander I and King Peter. Today The Royal Palace is the home of Crown Prince Alexander II and his family.

The White Palace is located within the same complex as The Royal Palace and it was commissioned by command of His Majesty King Alexander I as the residence for his three sons HRH Crown Prince Peter (the future King Peter II), Prince Tomislav and Prince Andrej. King Alexander I envisaged that his three sons would require their own private accommodation when they became of age, but his assassination in Marseille caused the



15:30-15:45 Drive to Temple of St. Sava

15:45-16:15 Temple of St. Sava visit

Monumental in proportions and still unfinished, this resemblance of 6th century Hagia Sophia church from Constantinople is already one of the most symbolic buildings in the city. The foundation stones were consecrated in 1930 and construction works started 5 years later. The whole site remained under carpets of bombs on 6th of April 1941 and the new, socialist government did not permit rebuilding. The works started again in 1985 and are still in progress.



16:30-17:00 Pedestrian street Knez Mihailova visit

Knez Mihailova is composed of multiple buildings and representative houses constructed at the end of the 1870s. It is thought that the center of the population of Singidunum was established here during Roman times and that it was full of streets with gardens, fountains and mosques during the Ottoman Empire.



17:00-17:30 Walk through Belgrade Fortress and old city center

The Belgrade Fortress changed and developed throughout the centuries, it saw many armies, was the field of many battles, it witnessed the brutality of the conquerors and the courage of the tireless defenders of the city. It was the place where Belgrade started to develop. The Fortress was built in stages, during the lengthy period between the 1st and 18th century, from a Roman castrum, through a Byzantine castle and the remains of the medieval capital of the Serbian Despotate, all the way to an Austrian-Ottoman artillery fortification.
